

SERVICE MEN OPEN NEW HEADQUARTERS

**Second Floor of Old City Hall
Dedicated as Home for Vet-
erans for Foreign Wars.**

"The action of a State senator in belittling the service men of the State, as was done when the bonus bill was under consideration, was the most humiliating and disgusting spectacle I have ever heard of," said Councilman-elect John E. McNabb of the Third Ward, in a stirring address here last night, marking the opening of the new headquarters of the Jacob Ferdinand Speer Post, No. 615, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and George P. Farrell Post, No. 1, Spanish War Veterans, on the second floor of the old City Hall Building, on Market street below Sixth.

Mr. McNabb, a Democrat, fathered the first bonus bill introduced in the Delaware Legislature when he was a member of the House 18 months ago. He scored the action of the Republican Senators in defeating a similar bill during the last session.

forgive the action of those senators." He promised the veterans his support while a member of City Council.

Captain Robert G. Woodside, distinguished veteran of the World War and Philippine campaign, and commander-in-chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, urged the restriction of immigration and virile Americanism, in an address to the ex-soldiers. The national commander urged the veterans to make a special effort in behalf of legislation at this time, at least, as a matter of justice to the thousands of American workmen who are unemployed and to the large number of their "buddies" who are also without work.

The commander-in-chief roundly condemned "hyphenated Americans" and those using prefixes of any sort before their names and nationality. Captain Woodside said that the purpose of the veterans' organizations was not to surrender the nation to the "idolizing of war," but to give inspiration through service and to stand ready at all times to defend the right and oppose the wrong.

Col. Simon P. Doherty, commander of the Spanish-American War Veterans, presided at the meeting. The new quarters in the historic old building were attractively decorated with the national colors.

Prior to the meeting Captain Woodside was entertained at luncheon at Lambros' restaurant. The affair was attended by all post officers and other guests.

Captain Woodside served with the 38th Infantry, Third Division, A. E. F. The unit took part in the Marne defense and later in the brilliant Aisne-Marne offensive. For unusual bravery and service during the latter engagement Captain Woodside was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the highest American honor. He was elected head of the Veterans of Foreign Wars at their last convention and has recently covered a speaking tour in forty states.
